Heading to the beach this month? Well, while you're exploring rock pools on the look out for sea **creatures**, keep your eyes peeled for different types of seaweed, too! These marine algae form the forests of the sea – providing shelter and food for thousands of animals. Scientists from the Marine Conservation Society and the Natural History Museum want to see how environmental **change** is affecting seaweed – and they need **YOUR help!** They're asking people all over the country to take part in the Big Seaweed Search, a huge species-spotting mission aimed at recording some of the UK's common seaweeds.

lays plant new woodlands!

Studies have shown that over half the oak trees in two new Cambridgeshire woods were planted

accidentally, by birds called Eurasian jays! Every autumn the shy woodland crows bury acorns underground – up to 3,000 of them per bird! They return to these secret stores during winter when food is scarce, but they can't always remember where the nuts are kept. As a result, some uneaten nuts eventually grow into adult trees.

One of the flourishing forests studied by the team from the UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology had originally been a farm, while the other had been grassland. This type of 'passive rewilding' is made possible when scrubland is left alone to regenerate. Brilliant!

SIGN LANGUAGE

It's **International Day of Sign Languages** on **23 September**, so let's find out about these amazing methods of communication...

Sign languages allow **deaf** people to communicate visually, using hand gestures, facial **expression** and **body** movement. More than 300 different sign languages are used around the world, by **72 million** people!

Just like **spoken** 2 Just like spoken language language, sign language changes based on where people live. For example, American Sign Language and British Sign Language are very different, even though they're both based on **English!** Plus, signers can have 'regional dialects' based on their home areas.

3 Excitingly, a team of **four British** teenagers have just won a £20,000 prize to develop an app called BSL: Educate-**2-Translate**, which translates sign language into spoken language (and vice versa) in real time, using videos. Wow!



Snakebite apps save lives!



In India, venomous snake bites kill up to six people every hour – but thanks to some amazing new apps, victims are getting life-saving treatment faster than ever before.

While in the UK we might associate mobile phone apps with ordering taxis or takeaways, people in rural India are using them to request help and even rescue after being bitten! Snake apps like Sarpa and Snakepedia connect victims to expert medical care as quickly as possible, maximising their chances of survival.

The apps also include identification guides which help witnesses report which species was responsible for the bite. This helps medics select the **correct anti-venom**. Ssss-super stuff!

Robotic hand plays Nintendo!


Scientists from the University of Maryland have created a 3D-printed robotic hand which can play Nintendo's **Super Mario Bros.** – and win!

The extraordinary hand is a flexible soft robot that's powered using water and air, rather than electricity. As a result, it can bend and move in an agile way - including using its fingers to press buttons on a controller!

A special computer program controls which finger presses which button and when - and it can do so without any help from a scientist. As a result, the robotic hand was eventually able to win the first level of the original Super Mario Bros. game by itself. Awesome!

FRIENDSHIP BENCH GRANDMOTHERS



More than **600 grannies** from **Zimbabwe** in **Africa** have **volunteered** to help people suffering with anxiety and depression. In Zimbabwe, these conditions are known as **kufungisisa** which translates as 'thinking too much'.

Though kufungisisa is a common **problem**, there are not enough specialist doctors to help everyone. So psychiatrist **Dr. Dixon Chibanda** came up with a plan - he would train grandmothers to offer support and guidance! Patients sit with the grannies on wooden 'friendship benches' for 'talk therapy'.

Since the scheme started in 2007, friendship bench grandmothers have helped over 30,000 people annually, in more than 70 communities across Zimbabwe. And the project is now run in **Malawi**, **Zanzibar** and even New York in the USA. Go, grannies!
